- Failure to create more quality, affordable health care options for small businesses and non-profits
- No restoration of HUSKY eligibility for parents up to pre-2015 levels
- Failure to extend coverage to all undocumented immigrants

The session is over but the fight continues.

The general assembly did the right thing and passed a bill expanding HUSKY (Medicaid) to undocumented children up to the age of 8, and

undocumented pregnant people. Now, Governor Lamont has to sign the bill into law. <u>Send a letter to tell him to do the right thing, too.</u>



The state budget does not meet the moment, and is a "knee on the neck of the Black community and other underserved communities of our state."

As part of the Recovery For All coalition, we called for a budget that generates new revenue to address equity for all state residents. Our state had the chance to make bold change as we move out of the pandemic. The budget fails to do that, plain and simple. As Sen.
