This is all thanks to the Covered Connecticut Program, which is run through the Office of Health Strategy in partnership with the Department of Social Services, Insurance Department, and Access Health CT.

The White House released an executive order focusing on enforcing Anti-Trust laws. What does it mean for Connecticut? Some highlights are protecting patients in hospital mergers, increased support for development of generic prescription drugs to prevent price gouging, and making hearing aids available over-the-counter. 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What does any of that mean? Hearing aids

According to the executive order, hearing aids are so expensive that only 14% of people who suffer hearing loss actually use them.

Imagine being able to get hearing aids without having to go through your doctor.

The order directs the department of Health and Human Services to issue new rules allowing hearing aids to be purchased over-the-counter.




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What does any of that mean? Prescription drug pricing:

According to the executive order, "pay-for-delay", a system in which drug manufacturers pay generic manufacturers to stay out of the market, raises prices by \$3.5 billion annually and reduces innovation.

How much less might you be paying if you could opt to purchase the generic version of your Rx?

The order encourages the Federal Trade Commission to ban pay-for-delay.



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What does any of that mean? Hospital mergers:

According to the executive order, the 10 largest health care systems own a quarter of the market. This leads to higher prices and shutting down needed services.

Since 2000, CT has gone from having 22 independent hospitals to only having 5.

The order encourages the Dept. of Justice and Federal Trade Commission to enforce anti-trust laws and stop monopolies that harm patients.



Insurance Rate Increases?

We know what you're thinking: how can health insurance get more expensive? That's a good question.

Health insurers certainly do not need to raise their rates, especially since the COVID crisis is not yet over. We're asking the State Insurance Department to use the tools available to them (a brand new health care affordability index, which we helped fund the creation of) to keep insurers in check as they ask for more money from hard working Connecticut residents.
